Congress of Vienna

- The Congress of Vienna was a series of meetings
- Meetings took place in 1814-1815
- Countries invited: Austria, Prussia, Russia, Britain and France

- Emperor Francois Austria
- British and French only represented by prime ministers





Congress of Vienna wants to go back to before 1789 (French Rev.)

Take me back to the good old days!



Congress of Vienna wants to go back to before 1789 (French Rev.)

Make sure no country in Europe would be <u>too powerful</u>

Fix the Map of Europe - <u>France loses</u> <u>land, German</u> states work together

Put Kings back in power

3 Goals

1. Prevent further French Aggression by surrounding France with powerful countries – make a few border changes


2. Create a balance of powers – this way no country is stronger, or can be more of a threat, than any other

3. Restore <u>royal families</u> to the thrones that they had held before <u>Napoleon</u> took power.

Other political changes

- <u>Conservatives</u> feared ideas of FR Rev would spread
 - Concert of Europe
 - Nations would help each other if another revolution broke out
- <u>Nationalism</u> spread in countries under foreign rule
 - <u>Spanish colonies</u> began declaring independence

Congress of Vienna

Members & Representatives

5 European "great powers": Austria, Prussia, Russia, Britain, & France

Goals:

Establish lasting peace & stability in Euro; prevent future FR aggression; restore balance of power; restore royal families to thrones

Actions Taken:

Created kingdoms and recognized independence; required FR to return territories conquered by Napoleon but left FR a major power; put ruling families back on the thrown

Legacy:

Short-term: Conservatives regained control of gov'ts; triggered revolts in colonies

Long-term: Created an age of peace in Euro; diminished power of FR & increased power of GB & Prussia; sparked growth of nationalism
