The King's Bedroom

The room was created by Louis XIV in 1701 and was where he lived until his death on 1 September 1715. In this room the royal rising and going to sleep ceremonies took place.

The attic, these paintings are from the collection of Louis XIV and are here back in their original setting. They are: The Four Evangelists and

Cesar's Demarius by Valentin de Boulogne, and, Agar in the Desert by Giovanni Lanfranco.















The Queen's Chamber
Official chamber of the queens of France; nineteen royal children of France were born here, including the future Louis XV. Marie-Antoinette escaped from the rioting crowd on 6 October 1789 out the door under the hangings left of the bed.

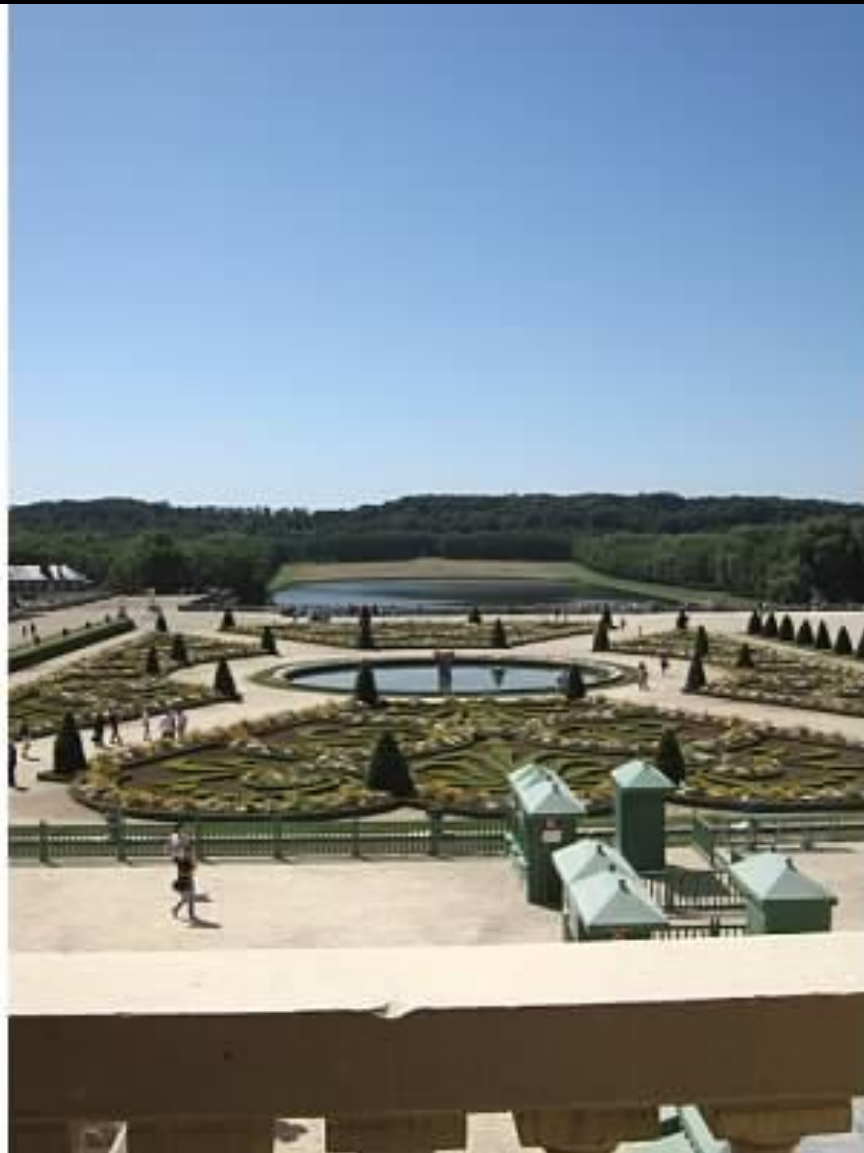
