Battle of Stalingrad

August 23, 1942

- Soviet leaders are told to defend the city to the death.
 - Symbolic since named after Stalin.
- November 1942→ Nazis controlled 90% of city

- Soviet troops outside the city launch a counterattack
 - Surround the city and cut off the German troops supplies

Battle of Stalingrad


February 2nd , 1943

- Hitler refuses to allow his troops to retreat
 - Over 200,000 Axis soldiers are killed and 235,000 were taken prisoner, only 6,000 of whom returned to Germany after the war.

 Soviet's lose over 1,000,000 soldiers in defense of the city

City 99% destroyed





Fall of Benito Mussolini

- Removed from power by King after Invasion of Italy
- Tried to escape to Switzerland with mistress Clara Petacci
- Was found when the Italian resistance ambushed German troops near Milan.
 - Was disguised as a German soldier
 - Caught and executed along with Petacci
- Bodies then hung from a gas station in Milan



Tehran

Roosevelt meets Stalin in Tehran before invasion of France

Agreed that:


- Stalin would launch an offensive at the same time as the Invasion
- FDR and Stalin agreed to break up Germany so it couldn't threaten peace anymore
- Stalin promised war with Japan when Germany defeated
- All agree to create world organization to help keep peace after war




When?

- Had to be at night to hide ships
- Low tide so soldiers could see underwater obstacles
- Low tide had to be at dawn so gunners could see targets on coast
- Moonlit night beforehand to see where to land for paratroopers
- Weather permitting, storm grounds airplanes, high waves swamp landing craft
- Days left?: June 5th-7th, 1944.

The Longest Day

- 5,000 ships with 100,000 soldiers
- 24,000 paratroopers drop into France

- Landing beach zones:
 - Utah- American
 - Omaha- American
 - Gold- British
 - Sword- British
 - Juno- Canadian

0015 Hour

- Special Forces Paratroopers
 - Extremely dangerous

Go in one hour before the airborne

 Set up landing zones and beacons to guide the pilots of the C-47s.

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Overlord Timeline > Marines

0630 Hours

- The operation, planned by a team under Lieutenant-General Frederick Morgan
 - The largest amphibious invasion in world history and was executed by land, sea and air elements under direct Anglo-American command
 - 160,000 soldiers landing on 6 June 1944
 - 73,000 Americans
 - 61,715 British
 - 21,400 Canadians.





Operation Market Garden

- September 1944 → Largest airborne assault in history
- Allied troops met much stronger resistance in the Netherlands than they previously thought.
- Highway 69→ Main road along attack route, nicknamed by soldiers, "Highway to Hell"
- Why was it unsuccessful?
 - Germans were able to quickly and effectively respond
 - The Germans found the Market Garden battle plans on the corpse of an American officer who should not have had them on the battlefield.
- Allies now realized the war would not be over by Christmas 1944

Battle of the Bulge


- December 16, 1944- January 25, 1945
- Snow and Cold
- American troops incorrectly equipped for winter

- Name:
 - Comes from the German offensive surprising American forces and creating a bulge in the Allied line.



Battle of the Bulge

- Americans trapped in Bastogne
- Eisenhower orders Patton's troops to rescue them
- German's suffer 100,000 casualties and running out of fuel.





Firebombing of Dresden

- Four raids between 13 and 15 February 1945
 - 722 heavy bombers of the British Royal Air Force (RAF)
 - 527 of the United States Army Air Forces (USAAF)
 - Dropped more than 3,900 tons of highexplosive bombs and incendiary devices on the city.
 - The bombing and the resulting firestorm destroyed over 1,600 acres of the city center.
 - Between 22,700 and 25,000 people were killed.

What is a *firestorm*?

- A fire which attains such intensity that it creates and sustains its own wind system.
 - It is most commonly a natural phenomenon, created during some of the worst of forest fires.
 - The phenomenon's determining characteristic is a fire with its own hurricane force winds from every point of the compass.







Dresden Firestorm (cont.)

 The center of the city, was engulfed in a firestorm, with temperatures peaking at over 1500 °C (2700 °F)

 People who hid in air raid shelters or bunkers were literally cooked to death as the bunkers turned into ovens.

 Number of exact dead impossible and many people were reduced to ash.


Trapped in Berlin

- Berlin is surrounded by Soviet troops
 - Hitler warned that they had about a day, maybe two, before the Soviets overtook the Führerbunker.
- Hitler had retreated to his bunker on January 16, after deciding to remain in Berlin for the last great siege of the war.
 - Fifty-five feet under the chancellery (Hitler's headquarters as chancellor), the shelter contained 18 small rooms and was fully self-sufficient, with its own water and electrical supply.
 - He left rarely
 - Once to decorate a squadron of Hitler Youth
- At his side were Eva Braun, whom he married only two days before their double suicide, and his dog, an Alsatian named Blondi.

Trapped in Berlin (cont.)

- Hitler urged to escape to Berchtesgarden, a small town in the Bavarian Alps where Hitler owned a home, the dictator instead chose suicide.
 - It is believed that both he and his wife swallowed cyanide capsules (which had been tested for their efficiency on his "beloved" dog and her pups).
 - For good measure, he shot himself with his service pistol on April 30th, 1945.
- The bodies of Hitler and Eva were cremated in the chancellery garden by the bunker survivors (as per Der Fuhrer's orders) and reportedly later recovered in part by Russian troops. A German court finally officially declared Hitler dead, but not until 1956.

Hitler's Death was not a sure thing in 1945. So the Allies posted this poster all over Germany in the possibility he might have not committed suicide and evaded capture.
